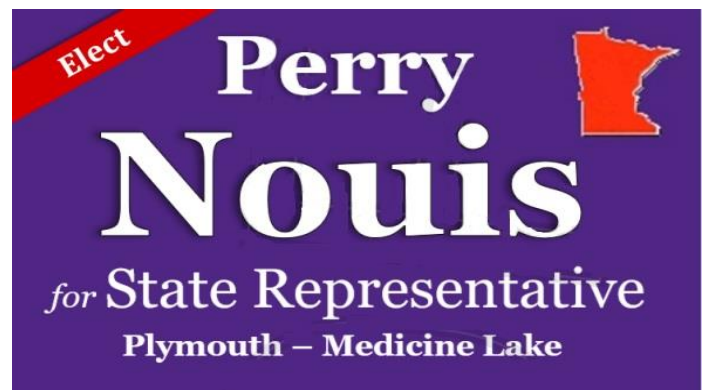

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THIS MONTH'S FOCUS: TAXES - NOW & COMING

You may have heard the Minnesota Legislature blew through (spent) an \$18 BILLION surplus. Think about that term for a moment – a multi-BILLION dollar tax surplus. Democrats have implemented so many taxes on Minnesotans over the years that they extracted “\$18 BILLION” more than they planned to extract. That’s 18,000 million dollars more than they planned to take from you. Did they give it back to you? A few hundred dollars, for some. The rest, spent. Meanwhile, the DFL wasn’t done with you ... how about another nearly \$10 BILLION in new taxes and fees over the next four years. Here are the taxes going up:

Total new taxes and fees in the House DFL budget over the next 4 years!

\$9.8 BILLION

Vehicle registration tax - \$787.8 million

Retail delivery fee - \$189 million

Gas tax (inflation indexed) - \$276.1 million

0.75% Metro Sales Tax Increase - \$2.09 Billion

Motor Vehicle Sales Tax (roads/bridges-60%) - \$128.8 million

Motor Vehicle Sales Tax (transit – 40%) - \$85.8 million
